

Well the domestic PSA events for 2017 got underway in March and the new BONUS system introduced by Squash Australia to encourage and support Australian players has commenced. Check out the AST Top 10 Leaderboard.

Zac Alexander, Mike Corren and Tamika Saxby were title winners during March.

Alexander demonstrated he was back to his brilliant best with a comprehensive 3-0 win over Josh Larkin 11-2, 11-6, 11-6 in the final of the Pure Blonde Elanora Open. He then went to Townsville and taught Rhys Dowling a painful lesson winning the National Closed 11-7, 11-2, 11-1.

Tamika Saxby returned from a tour overseas to win the National Closed against Lisa Camilleri in straight.
Camilleri put up a gutsy fight but went down 7-11, 8-11, 9-11.

Evergreen Mike Corren won back to back Esperance Opens. He beat David Illich in the PSA Closed Satellite final 11-4, 11-3, 11-4. Unfortunately, Corren did not earn

AST POINTS



The Australian Squash Tour has been designed to promote the domestic PSA events under one umbrella and encourage greater participation by our PSA players which will in turn, hopefully better support the individual events.

The AST will see the top three male and female Australian players share in an additional \$10,000 prize pool. Note: only a player's top 10 tournaments will be counted toward their overall point score.

Zac Alexander won the PSA M5 Pure Blonde Elanora Open (AST 5) and National Closed Championships (AST 10) to earn maximum points - 2650 (900+1750).

He leads from Rhys Dowling (350+1150) and Tom Calvert (200+700).

Tamika Saxby has only played in one event but that was enough to see her rocket to the top of the Leaderboard. Winning the National Closed earned her 1750 points.

Lisa Camilleri (350+1150) is running second whilst Samantha Foyle (350+700) is third.

With 6 players on 250 points it was decided to only show the Top 6 (8 players) on the Women's Leaderboard.

Our 4th Commonwealth Games article looks back at our greatest games ... the 2006 Melbourne Games

The team boasted 2002 World Champion David Palmer and two World Open Finalists: Natalie Grinham (2004) and Rachael Grinham (2005).

Natalie Grinham stole the show becoming the first athlete to ever win three gold medals at the one Games.

She won the Women's Singles before teaming up with her sister Rachael to win the Women's Doubles (becoming the first siblings to win gold in doubles at the Com Games).

She then teamed up with Joseph Kneipp to win the Mixed Doubles.

Palmer won a silver medal in Men's Singles before teaming up with Dan Jensen and Rachael Grinham to win bronze medals in both the Men's Doubles and Mixed Doubles.

After winning a silver medal in Men's Doubles at the Manchester Games, Stewart Boswell & Anthony Ricketts were hoping to go one better in Melbourne.

Unfortunately, it wasn't to be but they won their second consecutive silver medal in the event.

Australian athletes enjoyed their "home country" advantage in 2006. They achieved their highest medal haul - 13 including 5 gold, 4 silver and 4 bronze.

Melbourne was the first games where a bronze medal play off took place in all events. Therefore, 13 medals from a possible 24 was exceptional. The previous best result was 12 medals from 32 awarded (2002).

AUSTRALIA IN 2014 AT THE GLASGOW GAMES

In November 2015 you were ranked #66 in the World. You had just won the Queensland Open and the Malaysian Tour #8 titles. In February 2017 you achieved a career high ranking of 41. That is a significant improvement ... what do you mainly put that down too? Yes I'm happy with the jump and keenly eyeing the 30s at the moment. I had a great training block at the end of last year and targeted five events in North America at the beginning of this year which helped me get to my career high ranking so far.

You are travelling all over the World ... are you enjoying that? **Yes, luckily I'm quite** comfortable living out of a suitcase!

Are you still working with Cassie Thomas? Yes, I'm very fortunate to have her in my corner. (Note: Cassie Jackman was World Open Champion in 1999 and won 1 gold, 1 silver and 2 bronze medals across two Commonwealth Games in 1998-2002)

What do you feel you need to do to make the next big leap? Less thinking more fearlessness!

You represented Australia before at the Commonwealth Games - what was that like for you? *Incredible, a huge motivator.*

For the 2018 Games you are very much a leading contender for selection. Is it easier or tougher this time around? Well I'm in a better position this time but I'm also expecting more of myself whereas last time I was happy to have been selected so it's a bit of both.

What does playing for Australia mean to you? It's extremely fulfilling to represent more than just yourself against other individuals within your sport - being part of 'Team Australia' competing against other countries in multiple sports is an incredible feeling.

What would you prefer to play - singles or doubles? and why? **Both! Because** doubles has evolved into a faster, more exciting game than we previously knew, and singles is what I've competed in year round since childhood.

Have you had much doubles experience? At squad camps and international doubles events yes, but I haven't played on the big stage at the Commonwealth Games... yet!

When will you know if you are in the team or not? The current selection criteria document states mid September 2017.

Looking back at the Com Games has there been anyone that inspired you or a significant moment that you witnessed that said "I need to be a part of this"? Yes, the final day watching Rach Grinham, Dave Palmer and Cam Pilley win Gold in doubles (from the beginning of the gold medal matches to singing the national anthem while our flag was being raised). Their professionalism as individuals was impressive enough but the way they worked together as teammates was most admirable. I learnt a lot in Glasgow.

Your coach Cassie enjoyed success at the Com Games. Does she inspire you? Very much. She has enjoyed success in sport and life and is a great person (which is important to me because I feel that coaches have the ability to impact on a player's life both on and off court).

THE FINAL WORD

In a previous article I talked about our plan to build or foster the building of 10 significant Squash Centres around Australia in the next 10 years.

Even I was not prepared for the avalanche of correspondence that we have had since making this statement.

I received some excellent comments from people along the lines of "we need to make sure the current centres stay open" and "the centres of today need to get some facelifts so that they are attractive to customers" etc etc

These are all great comments which I of course agree with but in many cases I am powerless to influence these. What I can do is spread the word through our network so that if any of these centres are looking

for assistance they know where to get it.

I can report that Court-Tech (owned by Sarah Fitz-Gerald and her husband Cam) have been extremely busy around Australia upgrading squash facilities and building new courts.

I know that Grace Park in Melbourne has had a significant upgrade, new courts are being built in Gympie and there are many other projects that are yet to be declared.

So quite a lot is already occurring and there are a lot of Court Building and repairing companies operating now in Australia.

As I stated last year we will begin to see Squash Management Companies take over more Squash Centres and bring their expertise to a broader market.

In Perth the SquashWorld Group has three centres (Mirrabooka, Cambridge, Blue Gum).

In NSW and Victoria Squash Mechanics is managing centres and programs in 4 clubs (Willoughby, Westerfolds, Lane Cove, Bondi-Waverly).

The result of these and others is that Squash facilities are being upgraded and better management practices are being installed.

But our stated goal is of course to build more centres and we have received many enquiries from people asking how they can help.

So below are some simple ways that you can "keep an eye out for an opportunity" and of course there are many higher

levels of involvement that you can have.

1/ If you see or hear that any Council owned Leisure facility is looking to upgrade or expand let me know. This is a perfect opportunity to have a Squash Court Builder talk to them about adding courts. We have a lot of supportive data on why Squash should be included.

2/ The same applies for any school (usually private) that is undergoing expansion of sporting facilities. Squash is a definite pathway sport into the US Collegiate system so Private schools will become interested in this. Some States already have strong private school competitions and we firmly believe that once one school builds a state of the art Squash Complex, others will follow.

3/ If you know of any closed down squash

courts or centres let us know. We will contact the owners, advertise the centres and see if we can bring them back to life. So many advances have been made in keyless entry etc that many of the challenges that led to the closure of courts no longer exist.

4/ And of course if you are interested privately or professionally in investing in or becoming a shareholder in a new centre(s) then let me know as we will shortly be sharing more information on one of our other stated goals which is professional management systems for Squash Centres and this will of course make it of interest to investors.

We will build 10 significant squash centres in the next 10 years but that is only our minimum goal and I certainly hope to build more!
